Dear Parents and Caregivers,

We have had a positive and productive start to the term. This week we have our Olympics House afternoon. A great opportunity to build House spirit and to reflect on the Olympic values and how these align with our own PRIDE values. It is great to have our new gym up and running to start this event in.

Over the last few days there has been a great deal of commentary in the media over government change to Maths instruction in New Zealand. Here at Maniototo Area School, we have high expectations across all curriculum areas. We believe that literacy and numeracy are of critical importance. We know these skills are crucial for everyday life, for work and for future study. We will work to enhance learning in these areas, and we have teachers who are always ready to embrace change.

One of the statistics that has been used to describe our 'catastrophic' level of achievement does need some clarification. The government has said that only 22% of students meet the Year 8 target for Maths. I do want to note that this target is based on the new curriculum, that has different content and learning goals for each level. This new curriculum was released in draft but has never been implemented. In other words, the target is set on material that students have never been taught. The NMSSA data in 2022 shows that 42% of Year 8 students are not meeting the standard for Maths. We appreciate that this is far from ideal, but we also acknowledge that this rate of attainment has not changed over the last ten years. At Maniototo Area School annually only around 25% of Year 8 students are not meeting the standards for Reading, Writing and Maths. Given that the government aims to have only 20% miss these standards by 2023, we are well placed to continue to enhance and improve and I have no doubt we will meet this target well before 2030.

We also believe in a rich and balanced curriculum. We do prioritize literacy and numeracy instruction, but we believe in the value of all of the other learning areas - including PE, Science, Social Studies, Technology and the Arts. I am sure that as adults, we all look back on our own schooling and can reflect on the subjects that were personally engaging and motivating. We look forward to implementing the change, but we will also honour and protect the rich learning opportunities, the curriculum integration and the creative tasks that make MAS the school it is.
















Junior School Adventures
