Senior Art Trip

On Tuesday 18th February our Year 11 Art students went on a day trip to Karitane. We walked the track at Huriawa Pa and learnt the history of the people who once lived there led by Chief Te Wera. We explored the coastal area and learnt what the Ngai Tahu tribes way of life would've been like. We looked at the collecting of kaimoana, found clay the Maori used to make paint and looked into the uses of fauna in the area. The students also enjoyed some shell collecting, crab hunting, sand castle building and a paddle in the ocean! They will now use all this information gathered to present their findings and extra research visually for their first Level 1 Art achievement standard.

Science Department Adventures

Year 11 Science are currently studying freshwater quality and Ecology for their first Achievement Standard for Level 1 Science. We met Lucy Francke from Enviroschoools at various locations on the Sow Burn river, this being a very popular swimming hole we wanted to test the water quality. The students enjoyed getting knee deep in the water carrying out the various tests and catching and classifying the many fresh water invertebrates. All tests confirmed that this was very clean water and a healthy ecosystem.







The Senior Agriculture and Horticulture class recently visited Yellowstone Dairies limited and were treated to a guided tour with Peter Aitken through the dairy shed and pastures.

The students are studying how value can be added to the milk solid product, as well as understanding the environmental impact and mitigation involved with producing milk solids.

It is really great to get the students out on the farm, we are fortunate to have these real life experiences on our door step. Pete was a top tour guide, who shared a wealth of information, the students enjoyed testing pastures with him and his trusty sidekick "Gus".


Role Vacancies within the Club
